WORK EXPERIENCE

This year, both our Year 10s and Year 12s will have the opportunity to take part in a work experience week, this is a vital part of our students education and prepares them for working life

Why do Work Experience?

Spending some time with an employer, doing simple tasks, work shadowing or watching an experienced employer at work can be hugely beneficial for our students.

The reasons for doing work experience include:

- Developing transferable skills such as communication and teamwork
- Understanding how an organisation works
- Building confidence
- Enhanced opportunities for part-time and casual employment
- Provides valuable content in a CV or a UCAS statement

What if I can't find a placement that matches my career aspirations?

Any work experience, irrespective of the occupation will provide you with the opportunity to acquire transferable personal skills that will be useful for the rest of your working life.

What happens if I can't secure my own placement?

If you haven't found your own placement, students will be given access to an online system, Link2, to access a list of available jobs – these will mainly be in care homes, charity shops and pre-schools. They will make three choices and will then be allocated one of their choices, this will be done on 'first come, first served' basis and where it has not been possible to allocate one of their choices, they will be asked to pick again.

The Careers Library

There are various ways to search the careers library, by keyword, favourite subjects, skill, career area and theme. Each career page will explain what you'll do, working hours, entry requirements, skills needed and ideas on further reading and research.

It will also have a section on Labour Market Information (LMI) this shows how many current jobs there are, the future growth/decline and the average UK & South East salary - all important factors to take into consideration when deciding on a future career.
